## PEOPLE AGE 55+ WITH A CORI\* ARE...

- + High risk for housing instability and homelessness
- + Extremely low income
- + Low risk for committing a crime

## POLICY RECOMMENDATIONS FOR HOUSING AUTHORITIES:

Limit the use of CORIs in housing application decisions to only mandatory HUD guidelines once eligibility is determined

Establish formal partnerships between housing providers and reentry, behavioral health, and homelessness reduction provider orgs

Allow mitigating circumstances to be submitted before denial

Create explicit criteria for denial that is available publicly

Make aggregated documentation of denials with reasons for denial publicly available

Permit family members to house people with a CORI except mandatory HUD guidelines


